When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes? And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard. I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briars and thorns; I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it. SECOND READING

Hebrews 11:29-12:2

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace. And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets-- who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented-- of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground. Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance

the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

After a brief silence the presider stands; all rise as able for the proclamation of the Gospel.

Saint Mark's will again welcome the Lummi Nation on their 2016 Totem Pole Journey celebrating the decision that denied creating a marine terminal at Cherry Point, the largest coal port ever proposed in North America, and upheld their nation's Federal treaty rights and protects the sacred Salish Sea. This celebration will acknowledge and thank tribal alliances, people of faith and civic leaders who have supported their efforts. The 22-foot western red cedar pole carved and donated by Master Carver Jewell James will bear witness to the need for all peoples to work together in the name of our common humanity and our covenant with Mother Earth.
